TREASURY NOTES - DON'T LOSE INTEREST

Thanks to generous support from members and others in the community, the Townshend Historical Society has raised over \$7,000 in cash contributions, and we have sold \$1200 in merchandise this year. As a result of this show of support, we have received from foundations a total of \$15,000 with an additional amount of \$4,600 promised from the Vermont Council on Humanities.

We estimate that we will need \$20,000 more to reach our goal. Contributions are still welcomed. TAFT AND NICHOLS' HISTORIC MARKERS WILL BE INSTALLED THIS FALL

Historic markers honoring the Taft family and Clarina Howard Nichols will be installed and dedicated at a site in West Townshend this fall.

The time and place will be announced. Here are the inscriptions on the bronze memorial plaques:

Taft Homestead Site

In 1799, Aaron Taft settled on a 100-acre farm on Taft Hill. His grandson Alphonso, born here in 1810, served as Secretary of War and Attorney General under President Grant, and as Minister to Austria-Hungary and Russia. Alphonso's son, William Howard Taft (1857-1930) became 27th President of the United States and later Chief Justice of the Supreme Court. William's son, Robert A. Taft (1889-1953) was U.S. Senator from Ohio. Many other descendants became prominent in government service.

Vermont Division for Historic Preservation - 2001

Clarina Howard Nichols

Born in West Townshend in 1810, Clarina Howard became an early advocate of women's rights. After a divorce in 1843 she married George Nichols. As editor of the *Windham County Democrat* she strongly advocated women's property rights, child custody, temperance, and suffrage. In 1852 she became the first woman to address the Vermont Legislature, and lectured throughout New England and the Midwest. Nichols was a staunch abolitionist who seized the opportunity to move with her family to Kansas where her views on slavery and women's rights were widely accepted. During the Civil War, she was director of a home for orphaned black children in Washington, D.C. She died at her son's home in Pomo, California, in 1885.



VERMONT HISTORY PROJECT WITH LELAND AND GRAY STUDENTS

This collaboration with faculty and students aims to stimulate student's interest in Vermont history by a number of means. It presents students an opportunity for publication in print media and on the school or historical society web sites. It encourages original research on history involving all the West River Valley towns. Students may present documentation in research papers, artwork, dramatic or musical compositions, oral histories and photography.

A two-day planning workshop was held prior to the opening of school and a follow-up is planned for early November. In the words of one teacher, "This is a project with exciting potential. It could grow over time into something of precious value."
